Editor’s Note:

The symbol (sa) is an abbreviation of the prayer *sallallāhu ‘alaihi wa sallam* (peace and blessings of God be upon him), which we say after the Holy Prophet Muhammad (sa). Though the prayer has not been written in full it should nevertheless be understood as being repeated in full in each case.

Similarly the symbol (as) is an abbreviation of the prayer ‘*alaihi -salam* (peace be upon him) and is used at the mention of Promised Messiah (as) and all other prophets of God.

The symbol (aba) is an abbreviation of the prayer *ayyadhullahu ta’ala bi nasrihil ‘aziz* (may Allah be his helper) and is used at the mention of the current Khalifa (aba).

Hadith

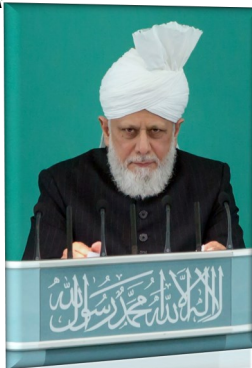
Do you know what are the rights of a neighbor? It is his right that if he asks you for help, you should help; if he begs for a loan you should lend; and if he becomes destitute you should render him aid. If he's ailing you should tend him; if he dies you should join in the funeral rites; if good befalls him you should facilitate him, and if he is afflicted by a calamity you should comfort and console him.

You should not raise your structure higher than his obstructing the passage of the breeze towards it, without his consent. If you bring home some fruit, send your neighbor a portion of it as a present. If you are unable to do so take it inside secretly and do not let your children come out with it causing distress to your neighbor's children. Let not the smell of food from your cooking pot disturb your neighbor unless you are ready to share it with him".

Excerpts From Huzoor's (aba) Addresses



Bismillah-ir-Rahman-ir-Rahim

Dear Neighbors, Ladies and Gentlemen

The prayer which I have just recited, Bismillah-ir-Rahman-ir-Rahim, means '*In the name of Allah, the Gracious, the Merciful.*'

This is the first verse of the Holy Qur'an. The Holy Prophet of Islam (sa) is reported to have said, rather he has commanded the Muslims, to recite this prayer before starting any task as otherwise it would be devoid of Allah's blessings. So with this beautiful teaching, how can a true Muslim be expected to wrong anybody, or do any work with bad intentions, or harm anyone, or create problems of any sort around his surroundings? A person who is starting any work in the name of the Gracious and Merciful God cannot

win the blessings and mercy of Allah unless God's attributes of being Gracious and Merciful are depicted in one's own gestures towards one's fellow beings.

In the light of this teaching, I would like to request you to remove any feeling or fear of mischief from Ahmadis residing in your neighborhood. The Qur'anic teachings for the rights of neighbors are so explicitly laid out that a true Muslim who is always seeking help from the Gracious and Merciful Allah cannot deviate from this, as any slight deviation might cause him to go astray and lose the blessings and love of God.

Allah the Almighty has enjoined treating other people with respect, love and kindness... A Muslim is duty-bound to serve humanity irrespective of color, caste or creed. Indeed alongside a person's relationship with Allah, every other possible relationship is included [ref Holy Qur'an 4:37]. This is why I said that when Islam teaches Muslims to fulfil the rights of their neighbors and to fulfil the rights of their relations, it actually incorporates all of mankind. Indeed, the Qur'an does not merely require different groups to live side-by-side, but rather it has actually established the rights of all people and all communities.

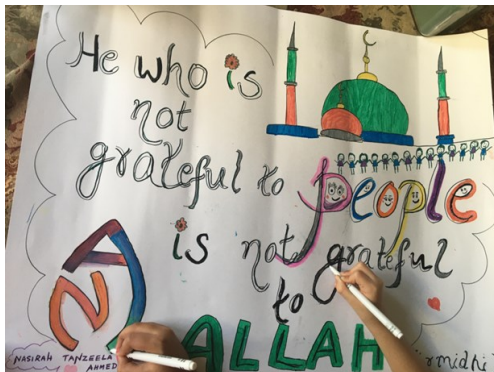
Since I was born and as far as I can remember I love my neighbors. Because my neighborhood is joyful, playful and love full. They never disturb us and they love to play with us.

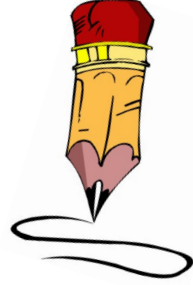

Then another tradition says:

‘Ibn Umar (ra) and A’isha (ra) relate that the Holy Prophet (sa) said: **Gabriel kept exhorting me about the neighbor till I imagined he would include him in the category of heirs.**’ (Bukhari and Muslim)

Huzoor (aba) said, “Our doors are always wide open and we very much welcome you at any time with open arms.”

When people show love for others, others will love them back and this turns into a chain reaction to spread peace and kindness throughout the world.

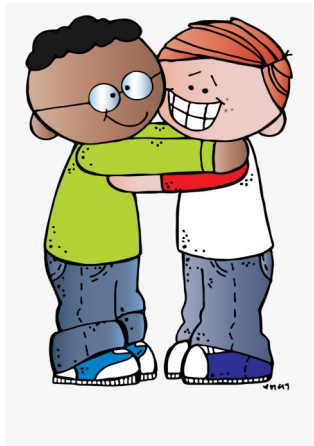


SOMETHING TO APPRECIATE

I will talk about loving thy neighbor. We do things for them and they do things for us. Be kind to your neighbors.

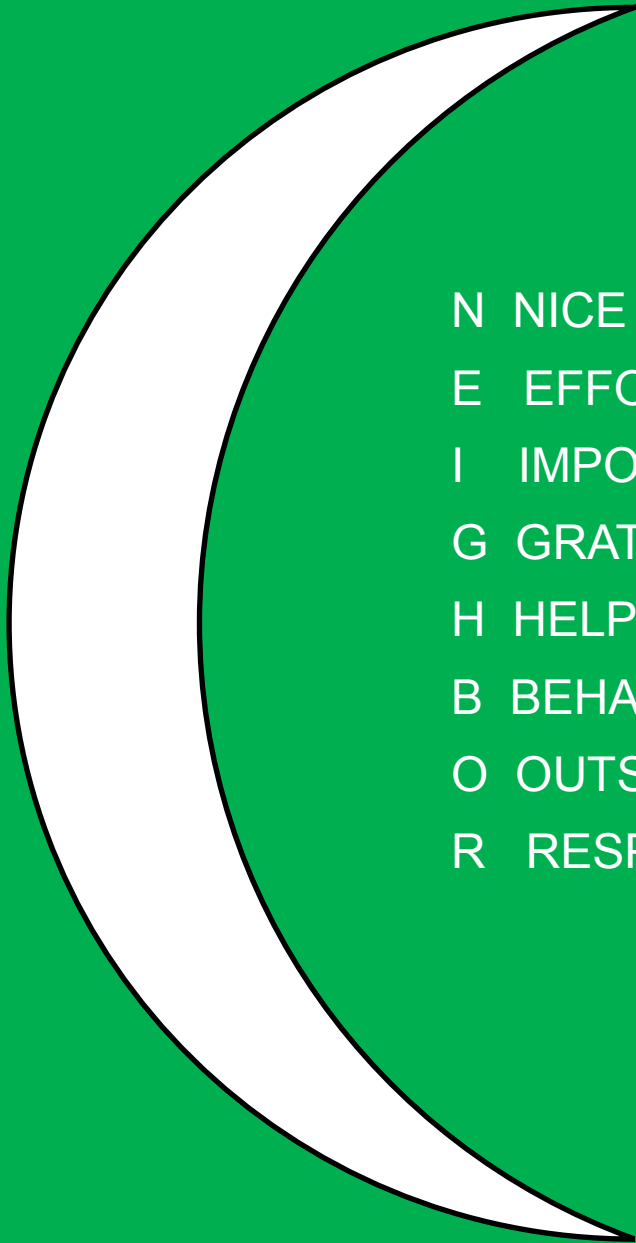

“Angel Gabriel recommended to me good treatment of the neighbor so often that I started thinking that he would perhaps declare him the heir and successor”.

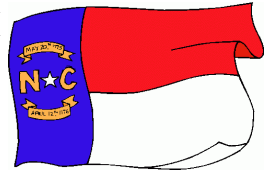

can't wait to bake for them again.

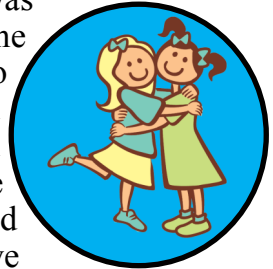

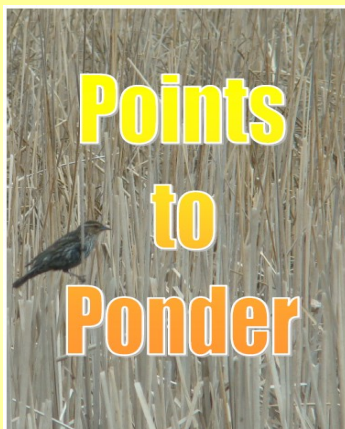

Islam and peace through the world. And what better way to start than with our neighbors and those close to us? Don't they deserve the same respect we would give to our families and fellow sisters?

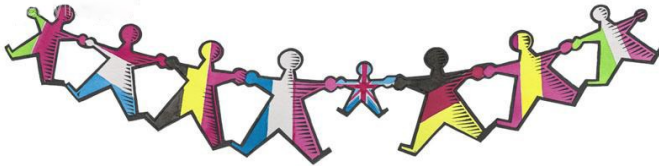

do, the consequences, and what you SHOULD be doing because of who you are and what you believe in.

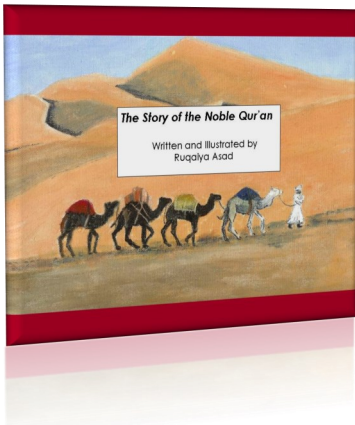

These things will help you Love Thy Neighbor, Jazakallah!



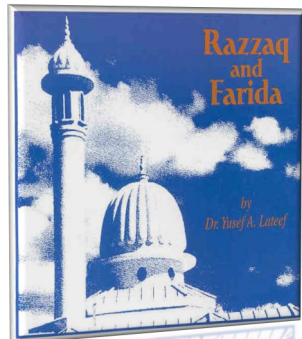
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Kindness

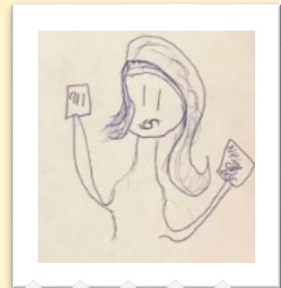

Look how Hazrat Muhammad (sa) exhorted Muslims to be good to their neighbors and to honor them when he said,

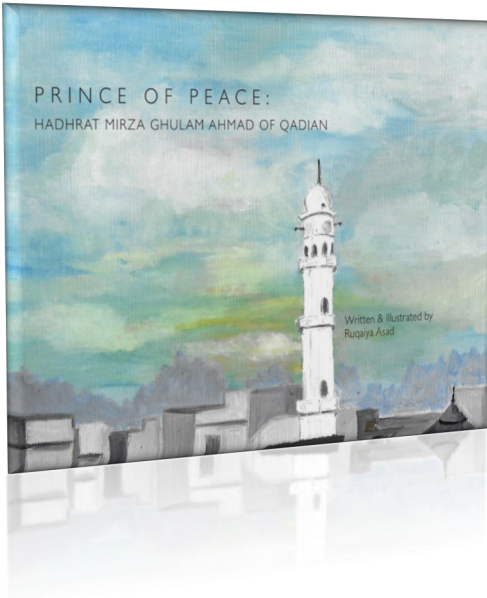
“None of you has faith until he loves for his brother [or neighbor] what he loves for himself.” (Sahih Bukhari).

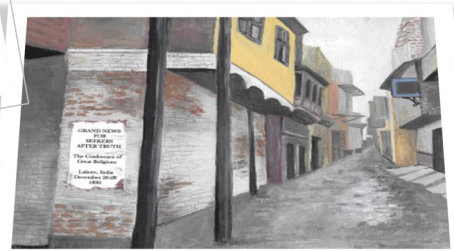
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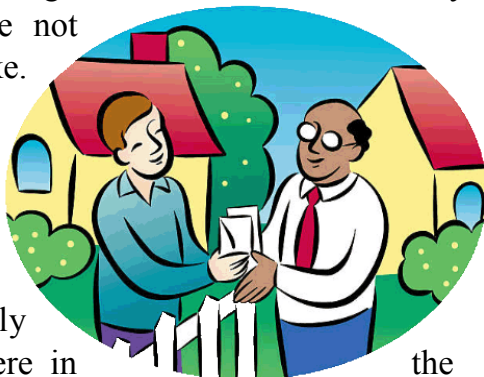
Helping Others

Glossary

Abū Dāwūd داود ابو : A collection of Aḥādīth. The author of this collection.

Al-Ḥamdu Lillāh اَلْحَمْدُ لِلّٰهِ : All praise belongs to Allah.

al-Hilāl الهلال : The new moon.

Āmīn [Āmeen, Aameen] آمين : So be it. Amen. Ceremony to commemorate the completion of the first reading of the Holy Qur'an.

As-Salāmu 'Alaikum اَلسَّلَامُ عَلَيْكُمْ May peace be upon you. (The formation assalam-o or assalam-u is incorrect as there is no waw و after mīm م, hence the abbreviation AoA or A.O.A. or A-o-A is also incorrect.)

Chanda: چنده Monetary contribution, donation. (The ha at the end is to indicate a fath on dal, and is not pronounced, so should not be explicitly written in the transliteration of the word.)

Ḥaḍrat حضرت [Hadhrat, Ḥaḍrat, Hazrat]: His Holiness

Aḥmad, Ḥaḍrat Mirzā Masroor (1950-...) حضرت مرزا مسرور احمد, may Allah strengthen him with His mighty support: Fifth successor (2003-...) to the Promised Messiah (peace be on him).

Ḥuḍūr [Ḥudhūr, Ḥuzūr, Huzoor] حضور : His Honor, His Holiness, Your Honor, Your Holiness. In Urdu, it is spelled Ḥaḍūr [Ḥaḍoor, Ḥadhūr, Ḥadhoor, Ḥazūr, Ḥazoor].

Iftār افطار : breaking the Islamic formal fast at sunset

Iftārī افطاری : eating to break Islamic formal fast.

Nāsirāt ناصرات : helpers (feminine). A member of Majlis Nasirat-ul-Ahmadiyya, association of young Ahmadi girls.

ṣadaqah صدقه : alms

ṣallallāhu 'alaihi wa sallam صَلَّى اللهُ عَلَيْهِ وَسَلَّمَ : peace and blessings of Allah be on him.

Sipara سپاره : One of the thirty parts of the Holy Qur'ān. [sī سی : thirty. pāra پاره : part] Juz جز in Arabic.
