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Editor's Note:

The notation (sa) is an of abbreviation the prayer ʻalaihi sallallāhu sallam wa (peace and blessings of God be upon him), which we say after the Holy Prophet Muhammad (sa). Though the prayer has not been written in full it should nevertheless be understood as being repeated in full in each case.

Similarly the notation (as) is an abbreviation of the prayer 'alaihis-salam (peace be upon him) and is used at the mention of the Promised Messiah (as)

and all other prophets of God.

The notation (ra) is an abbreviation of the praver radiyallahu 'anhu/'anha/'anhum (may Allah be pleased with him/ her/them) and is used for the companions of the Holy Prophet (sa) and the Promised Messiah (as).

The notation (aba) is an abbreviation of the praver <mark>ayyadahullahu ta'ala bi-nasrihil</mark> - 'aziz (may Allah be his helper) and is used at the mention of the current Khalifa (aba).



Dear Reader. As-Salāmu 'Alaikum!




I am delighted that our children are exposed to this excellent teaching at a young age. Please join me in reading their persuasive arguments on the saving grace of truthfulness.




Leave alone that which involves thee in doubt and adhere to that which is free from doubt, for truth is comforting, falsehood is disturbing (Tirmidhi).

TRUTHFULNESS Jalsa Address 8/27/2005

Hazrat Mirza Masroor Khalifat-ul-Mash Ahmad. (aba), referring to the writings of the Promised Messiah (as) said, "The Holy Our'an has also termed falsehood as an impurity and abomination, something filthy, as is mentioned [in the Holy Our'an]:

فَاجْتَنِبُوا الرِّجْسَ مِنَ الْأَوْثَانِ وَاجْتَنِبُوْا قَوْلَ الزُّورِ عَ

"Shun, therefore, the abomination of idols, and shun all words of untruth." [Ch. 22, V. 31]

Note here, that falsehood is positioned equal to idols. And in reality, falsehood is an idol. Otherwise, why would someone leave truth and gravitate towards falsehood. Just as idols have no truth to them, similarly falsehood is nothing but deception and a facade. Those who repeatedly lie lose their credibility to such an extent that even when they tell the truth, it is suspected that the statement is still interspersed with lies. Even when habitual liars wish to lessen their habit of lying, they are unable to do so right away. They would have to practice it for a long time before they could achieve the habit


of speaking the truth." (Al-Hakam. Vol 6:





Allah says in the Holy Qur'an:

"O you who believe! fear Allah, and be with the truthful" [Ch. 9, V. 119].

Ask the average person to define truthfulness and the answer will most likely be restricted to something about truthful speech. Islam, however, teaches that truthfulness is far more than having an honest tongue. In Islam, truthfulness is the conformity of the outer with the inner, the action with the intention, the speech with belief, and the practice with the preaching. As such, truthfulness is the very cornerstone of the upright Muslim's character and the springboard for his or her virtuous deeds

By practicing truthfulness, a person improves himself; his life is made upright, and due to it he is elevated to praiseworthy heights and raised in rank in the sight of God as well as the people. As the Prophet Muhammad (sa) related, "Truthfulness leads to virtue, and virtue leads to Paradise. A man continues to be truthful and strives for truthfulness until



he is written as a truthful person with God. And beware of falsehood, for indeed falsehood leads to sinning, and indeed sinning leads to the Fire. A man continues to tell lies and strives upon falsehood until he is written as a liar with God" (Saheeh

Muslim).

So, truthfulness is something which is to be cultivated till it becomes implanted in a person's soul and disposition and therefore reflected throughout the person's character. Ali



bin Abi Talib, the cousin and son-in-law of the Prophet Muhammad (sa), mentioned the positive reciprocal effect of behaving truthfully with people in this worldly life, he said, "Whoever does three things with regards to people, they will necessitate three things from him: Whenever he speaks to them he is truthful; whenever they entrust him with something he does not betray them; and whenever he promises them something he fulfills it. If he does this, their hearts will love him; their tongues will praise him; and they will come to his aid."

The people were very happy that the one who held the title of *Al-Amin* and *As-Siddiq* would be the one to lay the Black Stone in its proper position. The Holy Prophet (sa) treated all tribes fairly by putting the Black Stone on a cloth and allowing each tribe chief to hold the cloth and lift the stone up. Then the Holy Prophet (sa) placed the stone in

the corner of Ka'bah.

When the Byzantine Emperor Heraclius received a letter from the Holy Prophet (sa) inviting him and his people to Islam, he called the Arab trader, Abu Sufyan, who was then visiting his country to inquire about the Holy Prophet's (sa) integrity. Despite being a non-believer at the time and a strong opponent of Islam, Abu Sufyan testified that the Holy Prophet (sa) had exemplary honesty and unmatched truthfulness. Abdullah ibn Masood (ra) relates that the Holy Prophet (sa) said, "Truth guides to virtue and virtue guides to paradise. A person who persists in speaking the truth, goes on till in the sight of Allah, he is named truthful. Lying leads to vice, and vice leads to the fire and a person goes on lying till in the sight of Allah, he is named a liar" (Bukhari).

Many of us have heard the story of Pinocchio and how every time he told a lie, his nose got longer. Being honest and truthful takes you to places in life that you never could have dreamed of. Telling the truth is the easiest thing you can practice in order to be happy, successful and fulfilled. Truthfulness promotes openness, empowers us and enables us to develop consistency in how we present the facts. The Promised Messiah (as) said that speaking the truth helps you get to a higher level of *Taqwa* [righteousness]. The Promised Messiah (as) said, "Man should be inclined to the finer ways of *Taqwa*; therein is safety and well-being. If one does not take care of small matters then one day these small matters make one commit grave sins. Laxity and carelessness would set in and cause one's destruction. You should strive to attain high stations of *Taqwa* and for this, inclination towards finer ways of *Taqwa* is essential" (Translated from Malfuzat, Vol. 8, p. 106).


This issue is about truthfulness, so let's explore this topic further. Well to begin, telling the truth is a requirement of our faith. In the Holy Qur'an, it says:

In the Holy Qur'an, it states,

"Surely, men who submit themselves to God and women who submit themselves to Him, and believing men and believing women, and obedient men and obedient women and truthful men and truthful women, and men steadfast in their faith and steadfast women, and men who are humble and women who are humble, and men who give alms and women who give alms, and men who fast and women who fast, and men who guard their chastity and women who guard their chastity, and men who remember Allah much and women who remember Him — Allah has prepared for all of them forgiveness and a great reward" [Ch. 33, V. 36].





This illustrates how truthfulness has good results. On the other hand, lying has consequences. For example, if you lie, then people might lose trust in you. 

This verse tells us that those people who lie about the things Allah the Almighty says will not do well in their lives and that they'll get punished for saying these things. This is the reason God sends prophets. Because people need reformation and someone to set a high standard of truthfulness.

Being Ahmadi Muslims, it is an added responsibility on us to strive to be good and to stay away from falsehood. We



must act upon the conditions of Bai'at. The Second Condition of Bai'at reminds us to stay away from falsehood and says, "Keep away from falsehood, cruelty, adultery, dishonesty, disorder, rebellion..." If someone has the habit of lying about things, then they not only destroy their own personality, but they also lose Allah's approval.



The Promised Messiah (as) said that lying is like has associating partners with Allah. He has told us that idol worshiping and lying are equally bad. Just as people would put their trust in idols to keep them safe, people put their trust in lies. They don't think that putting their trust in God is enough, so instead they rely on falsehood to protect them. They forget that God is the only one who can keep them safe and that everything else has no value Because of this Promised Messiah (as) has said


Sometime later the man came back and told the Holy Prophet (sa) that

having followed his advice he was free from all three vices. When the Holy Prophet (sa) asked him for the details of his struggle the man said, "One day I wanted to indulge in one of the three evils and was about to do so when I thought of my



promise to you and realized that if any of my friends asked me about it, I would have to admit it as I could no longer utter a falsehood. This meant that I would acquire an evil reputation among my friends and they would in future avoid me, thinking this, I've persuaded myself to stay away from those evils."



worship. We should not depend on our lies because Allah watches over us, and if think our we lies can save



Truthfulness in Islam



watches over us all the time, and for Him to abandon you would be terrible.







Abdullah ibn Mas'ud relates that the Holy Prophet (sa) said, "Truth guides to virtue and virtue guides to Paradise. A person persists in telling the truth till in the sight of Allah he is named Truthful. Lying leads to vice and vice leads to the Fire; and a person goes on lying till in the sight of Allah he is named a liar" (Bukhari and Muslim).

Truthfulness is one of the most important practices in Islam. In the above Hadith the Holy Prophet Muhammad (sa) has said that a person telling the truth will go to Heaven and will be named the Truthful. What a wonderful name to have! He also said that

The Unhindered Truthfulness of Hazrat Abu Bakr

Amongst the different morals in a human being today, there is one trait that has never failed to dominate ascendancy. A principle that would make communication much more effective and prevent the largest conflicts we see today; truthfulness. When someone is honest, they know they are doing the right thing by telling the truth. Being unswervingly committed to truthfulness is found in the purest personalities that ever lived. This trait was divinely manifested in the first successor of the

Holy Prophet (saw), Hazrat Abu Bakr (ra).

When the Holy Prophet (saw) passed away, who was it

that helped the Ummah regain their sense of direction giving true context to situation? The Muslims were in such a state of sorrow, and Hazrat Abu Bakr (ra) must have felt the loss even more as his best friend. In the Friday Sermon of February 18, 2022, Huzoor (ab) stated that at this precarious time when Muslims were unable to accept that the Holy Prophet (sa) had





died, Hazrat Abu Bakr (ra) quoted the Quranic verse:

"And Muhammad is only a Messenger. Verily, all Messengers have passed away before him. If then he die or be slain, will you turn back on your heels? And he who turns back on his heels shall not harm Allah at all. And Allah will certainly reward the grateful" [Ch. 3, V. 145].

After hearing this, the Ummah regained their balance and realized the truth, that all Messengers will eventually die, being human. Maintaining his title **As-Siddiq**, the Truthful, he delivered an essential message for that time and re-oriented the sorrow-struck Muslims.

Huzoor (ab) said that, "Hazrat Abu Bakr (ra) rendered an amazing service to the Muslim Ummah by reciting and



explaining this verse to the all companions gathered on that day. Had he not done so, later clerics could have also said that Jesus (as) is also still alive. However, Hazrat Abu Bakr (ra) explained the truth behind the demise of the Holy Prophet (saw), whilst also dispelling any other erroneous notions." Hazrat Abu Bakr (ra) dealt with this situation in a straightforward

way and subsequently subdued any rising ideologies at the time that Jesus (as) was still alive, by facing the truth of the Holy Prophet's (sa) death and the death of all previous messengers. Through this incident and many others, Hazrat Abu Bakr Siddiq (ra) lived up to his title, and proved that he possessed the crucial trait of honesty while maintaining piety. He was the pure essence of truthfulness and never failed to stick to this principle.







KNOW?

The Arabic word **Murabbi** means guardian or protector. It means the one who understands the true guidance from Allah and can impart it to others.

Our **Murabbis** are those who study Allah's guidance for a prolonged period of seven years and learn how to impart it to others, they learn how to teach us about Allah and His Commandments.

Our first **Murabbi** to come to America was Mufti Muhammad Sadiq (ra) who came in 1920. We recently celebrated the centenary of his devoted work and service to the religion and how he started Islam Ahmadiyya in America. Due to the various Jami'a [Ahmadiyya Universities where Missionaries who have devoted their lives for the service of Religion are trained], and especially those in UK and Canada, and due to the Waqf-e-Nau scheme which encourages lifedevotees to become a **Murabbi**, many more **Murabbiyan** have been trained to do this important work. 


Prophet Muhammad (sa) said, "Truthfulness leads to righteousness and righteousness leads to Paradise" (Bukhari).

Glossary

Abū Dāwūd ابو داود : A collection of Aḥadīth. The author of this collection.

Adhan: The call to prayer

Al-Ḥamdu Lillāh الْحَمْدُ لله : All praise belongs to Allah.

Al-Hilāl الهلال : The new moon.

Āmīn [Āmeen, Aameen] آمين : So be it. Amen. Ceremony to commemorate the completion of the first reading of the Holy Our'an.

As-Salāmu 'Alaikum السَادَةُ عَلَيْكُمُ May peace be upon you. (The formation assalam-o or assalam-u is incorrect as there is no waw , after mīm , hence the abbreviation AoA or A.O.A. or A-o-A is also incorrect.)

Bukhari: A collection of Ahadith. The author of this collection. Chanda: چنده Monetary contribution, donation. (The ha at the end is to indicate a fath on dal, and is not pronounced, so should not be explicitly written in the transliteration of the word.)

Ḥaḍrat صرت[Hadhrat, Ḥaḍrat, Hazrat]: His Holiness

Aḥmad, Ḥaḍrat Mirzā Masroor (1950-...) محضرت مرزا مسرور احمد, may Allah be his Helper: Fifth successor (2003-...) to the Promised Messiah (peace be on him).

Ḥuḍūr [Ḥudhūr, Ḥuzūr, Huzoor] حضور : His Honor, His Holiness, Your Honor, Your Holiness. In Urdu, it is spelled Ḥaḍūr [Ḥaḍoor, Ḥadhūr, Ḥadhoor, Ḥazūr, Ḥazoor].

Ifṭār افطار : breaking the Islamic formal fast at sunset Iftārī افطارى : eating to break Islamic formal fast.

Ijtema: gathering

Jalsa Salana: Annual Convention

Jama'at: Community Muezzin: caller to Prayer

Nāsirāt ناصرات : helpers (feminine). A member of Majlis Nasirat

-ul-Ahmadiyya, association of young Ahmadi girls.

Sadaqah عدة: alms Tabligh: Preaching
